

RIB STITCH

Rib stitches are created by combining knit and purl stitches. The most common is **K1, P1 rib (Fig. 21)** but you could have a K2, P2 or even K3, P1 rib. What's important to remember is to always have your yarn in back when you knit and in front when you purl.

Once the sequence of stitches is established, remember to **knit the knit stitches** and **purl the purl stitches** as they appear on the row on which you are working.
